## **ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, JUNE 3, 2019**

The Town will once again assemble together on Monday, June 3, 2019 to set the Fiscal Year 2020 budget and to discuss various items, including by law amendments and spending articles. The Warrant has been posted. Included for spending requests are to outfit each Police Cruiser with Alice Kits, purchase a new police cruiser, expend funds on a sewer expansion study, which would carry sewer services down Route 138, and to purchase a six-wheel dump truck. The Finance Committee recommended to defer to the Fall Town Meeting for many of the other spending articles. I hope to see you there!

One procurement, with its many rules, is time consuming enough. But to roll out four at one time is an impressive feat, considering they still have plenty of departmental work to do. I'd like to thank and recognize them for holding taxdollars in particular esteem and trying to save them in any way we can. Trash services is quite an expensive endeavor, but obviously necessary. It is easy to get caught up in long-term agreements with escalator clauses that tend to creep up the cost incrementally until it is exhorbitant. The Town has been fortunate



and remains so to continue its services with Borges Trucking, a company from many accounts provides the aboslute best customer service. This department is also working to lower disposal costs by rolling out new programs in partnership with the state, including the textile reclycing program already underway and a new Recycling IQ program.
